

Robert Cottingham (American, born 1935)

Biography

Robert Cottingham is best known for his paintings and prints that depict the urban American landscape, building facades, neon signs, movie marquees, and storefronts. His work explores the visual language of commercial signage, often highlighting isolated words or letters with psychological or humorous resonance.

Cottingham served in the U.S. Army (1955–1958) before studying advertising and graphic design at Pratt Institute in New York (1959–1963). After graduating, he worked as an art director in advertising agencies in New York and Los Angeles, where he was deeply involved in design and production. Influenced by Pop Art and eager to pursue his passion for painting, he began painting daily after work and eventually transitioned fully to art in 1968.

His advertising background heavily shaped his artistic style, particularly his use of typography, cropping, and scale. Cottingham often credits Pop artists like Andy Warhol, who also came from advertising, as key inspirations. His interest in text reflects the influence of artists such as Robert Indiana and Jasper Johns, while his monumental scale recalls the work of James Rosenquist. In 1964, Cottingham moved to Los Angeles, where the distinct urban environment inspired him to commit seriously to painting. A later stint in London (1972–1976) left him disconnected from his American-centric subject matter, prompting a return to the U.S., where he settled in rural Connecticut.

During the late 1970s and 1980s, his compositions became more expansive, capturing broader urban vistas and entire neighborhoods. By the late 1980s and early 1990s, his focus shifted to include trains and railroad imagery, further expanding his visual exploration of American vernacular culture. Since the late 1990s, he has turned his attention to vintage typewriters, drawn by their design and nostalgic associations.

Cottingham has taught at the Art Center College of Design in Los Angeles and the National Academy of Design in New York. His work has been featured in major exhibitions, including *Documenta* (Kassel), the Centre national d'art contemporain (Paris), the Whitney Museum of American Art (New York), the Samsung Museum of Modern Art (Seoul), and the Deutsche Guggenheim (Berlin). A solo presentation of his prints was held at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American Art in 1998–99.

He currently lives and works on a farm in western Connecticut.
